## Sabbatical Corner

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**Lee Blackstone (SOC)** The purpose of the original sabbatical request was to conduct further research into Romanian music, identity, and nationalism, and to begin writing a new academic journal article. Further, I was also interested in exploring what I hoped would be part of the theoretical foundation of this new article: how to 'bring together' what might appear to be two incompatible paradigms -- the symbolic interactionist perspective, and existentialist philosophy. In sum, the above train of thought was formulated by the essential time afforded by this sabbatical period. I was also able to re-listen to/transcribe my interviews from my fieldwork in Romania, as well as obtain new interview material. Most importantly, I have begun writing what will be an academic journal article concerning Romanian music and identity.

**Laura Chipley (ASMC)** The purpose of my sabbatical leave was to continue working on my current project, Virtual Aquapolis, an immersive, interactive VR environment that examines the transformation of NY Harbor from a rich, biodiverse maze of marshlands, reefs and estuaries into the network of urban waterways surrounding NYC today. Created in collaboration with Prof. Samara Smith, this project will be presented in public space and as a free download for consumer devices, and will offer a unique perspective from which to reflect on the harbor as a space perpetually shaped by the resilience of nature and shifting human values. I recorded a series of underwater 2D and 360° videos in natural waterbodies under various environmental conditions and imported them into Unity/Unreal, alongside objects obtained from a free online 3D asset marketplace. These mockup experiments created in tandem with extensive background research, were an important step in making an educated decision about which software will be best suited for our project.

## Sabbatical Corner

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**Bright Emenike (CHEM)** During my sabbatical leave, I achieved my primary goals: I attended the Gordon Research Conference to gain insights into the latest developments in Artificial Molecular Switches and Motors, a subfield of molecular machines. In line with this, my students and I have designed multiple molecular torsion balances for measuring anion- $\pi$  interactions in solution (work in progress). Throughout the sabbatical, I continued mentoring undergraduate students in research; these students co-authored peer-reviewed publications. Moreover, I utilized the time to publish several research manuscripts and prepare an NSF grant for imminent submission. Additionally, amid the COVID-19 pandemic, I conducted a literature review to assess the efficacy of teaching chemistry laboratory courses online.

**Edislav Manetovic (PEL)** I decided that exploring the creation and the evolution of the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) is a far more insightful and salient way of studying the intersection between nationalism and international relations. I studied primary and secondary sources about the NAM. From June to July and then again in November of 2022, I spent time in the Archives of Yugoslavia. The Archive is in Belgrade, the capital of former Yugoslavia which was one of the founding members of the NAM. The Archive has a rich collection of documents on bilateral and multilateral meetings between heads of state from developing, non-aligned countries.

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
**Lorenz Neuwirth (PSY)** The project consists of characterizing a novel rat mutant model that I created at SUNY-OW where I cross-bred a Sprague Dawley tyrosine hydroxylase enhanced green fluorescent protein (SD-TH-EGFP) rat with a standard Long Evans Hooded rat (LE) to create a LE-TH-EGFP rat. This work was formally acknowledged by the Michael J. Fox Foundation for developing a new rat model that may benefit both Parkinson's disease research as well as any research on the dopaminergic system in the rat model. The latter showed promise as the National Institutes of Health (NIH) wanted to determine how they might be able to acquire a license to support the dissemination of the rat model to researchers nationally interested in the model as an approach to advance addressing disorders and diseases of the dopaminergic system.

**Sarah Smith (PH)** My sabbatical plan was to finish my book *Forgotten Bodies: Imperialism, Chuukese Migration and Stratified Reproduction in Guam*. Rutgers University Press (Nov. 2023) and connect with communities in which I work to develop a grant-writing plan for future projects. Connecting with community organizations, scholars, and researchers in Guam is challenging from afar. During my sabbatical, I wanted to take the time to fly out and meet with stakeholders, renew established relationships, develop initial ideas for future projects, and then return to the US, continuing zoom meetings as I prepare for a grant proposal.


**Margaret Torrell (ENG)** My sabbatical work began in January 2023 with research on the role of the Humanities in 21st century education and innovations in the ways the Humanities is studied in the contemporary college classroom. Based on this research, over the course of the Spring 2023 sabbatical semester and into the summer, I developed a conception for the SUNY Old Westbury Humanities Hub, a series of grants that will provide 360 degree support for the innovative study of the Humanities at our University. Each grant concept is at the outline stage. In addition to my development of the grant concepts, the research I’ve done has also reinvigorated my teaching, and I have plans to incorporate several new techniques for engaged learning in my Humanities-based courses.


# New Course News

## HI3620 Digital Mapping

An introduction to the theory, techniques and practice of Digital Mapping and Geographic Information Systems (GIS). The course provides the basic elements needed to interpret spatial information, process it and present it in the form of digitally produced maps using applications such as Google Maps, OpenStreetMap, Carto DB and QGIS. The course also provides students with the tools to critically read and interpret maps as powerful sources of information.

# SEJI Students first to Decorate Ole Worm




The students living in the Woodlands 1 Social and Environmental Justice Living Learning Community were the first to participate in the new OW tradition of decorating the Ole Worm statue.

# Physics Faculty Receive DOE Grant

**John Estes and Matthew Lippert** (Physics), in collaboration with researchers from Brookhaven National Laboratory (BNL), have received a \$1.15 million grant from the US Dept. of Energy, under the Reaching a New Energy sciences Workforce for High Energy Physics (RENEW-HEP) initiative, of which \$1 million will come to Old Westbury. The RENEW-HEP program aims to promote diversity in high energy physics by supporting students at minority-serving institutions (MSIs). The grant will support physics students through two-year traineeships, which include a 10-week summer research program at BNL.


