
A Celebration of Excellence


M.A.T. English Education Student, Kerrin Denue, Honored at Delta Alphi Pi Honor Society Induction



Urban Hymn

Congratulations! Adjunct Professor Dr. Adam Davison earns Ed.D.

Dr. Adam Davison is an adjunct instructor for both the Students with Disabilities and Literacy Graduate Programs at SUNY Old Westbury. Dr. Davison earned his Ed.D. in Educational Leadership and Policy from Hofstra University in May 2025. His qualitative case study, "Teacher Leadership in a Grade Team Program as a Capacity Building Model for School Leadership," examined the development of a middle school teaming program in a Nassau County public school district and how former teacher leaders applied their experiences as team facilitators in their current roles as school and district administrators. The study also explored how these leaders now support team facilitators in cultivating leadership skills. Through interviews and document analysis, Dr. Davison identified key themes such as trust, collaboration, diverse perspectives, mentoring, and shared leadership, alongside challenges like burnout and barriers to transitioning into administrative roles.

We applaud Dr. Adam Davison on his accomplishments and for his commitment to the field of education and our students at SUNY Old Westbury.
