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### Data Analytics and Lifelong Learning Agility

In a recent article in the Harvard Business Review, <u>Yael Garten</u>, the **Director of Siri Data Science and Engineering at Apple** addresses the opportunities and challenges that increases in emphasis on data sciences and analytics pose for businesses and (therefore) business schools. She draws a distinction between data scientists that analyze data for humans and those that provide data analytics for machines.

As the MMF Department and Accounting Department in the SOB engage in visioning and strategic planning exercises vital for our future, Garten presents opportunities that can guide us in training successful business leaders prepared for the businesses of tomorrow and beyond. She believes that businesses will need leaders equipped to improve data-driven decision-making using descriptive and predictive analytics. In addition, a business leader that is technologically agile will be able to learn and relearn innovative disruptions that are yet to emerge in the areas of data quality, data management, data visualization, access platforms, and data stewardship.

Garten then goes on to conclude with: "A final piece of advice for those hiring data scientists: Look for people who are in love with solving problems, not with specific solutions or methods, and for people who are incredibly collaborative…look for people who have high integrity. As a society, we have a social responsibility to use data for good, and with respect. Data scientists hold the responsibility for data stewardship inside and outside the organization in which they work."
