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Leadership: A Call to Success



"Authentic leadership" is a much discussed leadership style that has dominated the 21st century. What does it mean to be an Authentic **Leader?** Bill George, former CEO of Medtronic and author of the book <u>Discover Your True North</u> sets out to define what makes an Authentic Leader. He argues that the most effective leader is the Authentic Leader, one who embodies an understanding of self before being able to lead others. The Authentic leader creates meaningful relationships and pursues life with purpose. How does one lead with authenticity? First, understand what is important to you. This involves continuous selfreflection and assessment of your values. What is your passion? What is your purpose? Often society, culture, friends and family all have a way of influencing what we think we should do.

Strip out the external noise and listen to your own voice to find your own path in life. Second, create meaningful relationships. Seek out honest feedback – while difficult to hear at times, accepting honest feedback is an opportunity to learn something about you. Honest conversations set the foundation for building trust and deep relationships. Authentic leaders are persons of integrity with a complete devotion to balancing mind, heart, and soul in the service of their teams. At its core, being a leader is about who we really are as humans.


