in the lives of our students. According to a poll
(https://eab.com/insights/daily-briefing/studentsuccess/these-grads-are-3x-more-likely-to-saycollege-was-very-rewarding/) from Elon University,
students who had seven or more meaningful
mentor relationships during college are three times
more likely, over the average graduate, to say
college was a rewarding experience.

Leadership expert Anthony Tjan, in a **TED** Talk, identifies five types of mentors that students may need to boost their capacities to become successful in their professional fields. Students may need the **Master of the craft mentor**, the expert in the field, if the students have identified the path to follow and are willing to do their best in the field. At some point, students may need a **Champion of the Cause mentor** to advocate to others for them because these mentors know the students capabilities. Every journey is much easier with company, so the students may need a **Copilot mentor**, a friend, the trustful person to talk about projects and get help in navigating related matters. At the point of one is hitting speed bumps, students may needed an **Anchor mentor** to boost their morale, to help stay on the journey and to reach their goals. Once the students become mentors, they can be **Reverse mentors** who will pass on knowledge to mentees as well as learn more from mentees.
