In a recent article, Kevin Dickinson summarizes some basic habits that make us effective lifelong learners. **First**, cultivate a growth mindset; people with a growth mindset recognize that there is always room to set SMART (**S**pecific, **M**easurable, **A**ction-oriented,

Realistic, and **T**ime-defined) goals. **Second**, spend five hours each week learning; Benjamin Franklin set aside an hour each weekday to keep learning after he left school at the age of 10, writes Kevin Dickinson for Big Think. **Third**, test your understanding; our brains remember information better when we interact with it more actively. **The fourth** is to prioritize; you may find that 20% of the content learnt will lead to 80% of your progress. Find motivation, lifelong learners need to find their own motivation, whether it has to improve themselves or advance their careers. **Finally**, Dickinson urges us to celebrate progress, despite the difficulties; reward yourself for reaching milestones along the way.
